
An occupational therapist has the following competencies or is competent of:

Diagnosing In order to professionally assess the occupational problem as experienced by a client and/or the client

Working with and on behalf of clients, in terms of

system, and to assess whether and to what extent the occupational problem can be addressed, the occupational therapist methodically analyses the occupational problem. This will result in defining the most effective and efficient approach, in consultation with the client and/or the client system. As a result, the client's occupational performance will be improved and retained.

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Patient treatment and counselling

In order to improve and retain the client's occupational performance and participation, the occupational therapist methodically treats his/her client and/or the client system, and provides counselling and advice. As a result, the client will be able to retain or to regain control of his life, and to perform the preferred roles and duties contributing to his health and welfare. Providing advice

Supervision

In order to improve the client's occupational performance and participation, the occupational therapist methodically provides advice to customers33 about counselling, tools, facilities or working conditions. This will indirectly contribute to the health and welfare of individual clients or groups of clients and/or

Working in and from an organization, in terms of Cooperation In order to gear occupational therapy activities to all-in client service (and service to the client system), the occupational therapist makes a professional contribution to the (multi)disciplinary team. This competence, as well as proactive cooperation guarantee effective and efficient internal and external

Management and policy making

In order to position and realize the identity of the occupational therapy profession, the occupational therapist adequately manages financial means and materials, which guarantees effective and efficient client service. In addition, initiating new policy guarantees future service and an adequate response to social developments.

In order to stimulate competent learning behaviour in trainees and (new) colleagues, the occupational therapist supervises learning processes. This way, (starting) occupational therapists make a professional contribution to realize the organization's objectives.

In order to position and realize the continuation and development of services and products, the occupational therapist takes market-directed, business and commercial initiatives. This guarantees


